1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

ABOUT THE COLLEGE

Govt. Arvind College Kirandul had a humble start with just one room and 2 lecturers at community centre Kirandul by Bailadila education society with undergraduate course in Arts in 1973 as a private night college. It came under the government of Madhya Pradesh in 1983. . It has been disemminating knowledge and awareness through education over past 47 years .Kirandul is situated in Dantewada district in the state of Chhattisgarh. The area consist mostly of ST,SC and OBC students .. It is the only college of the district within 50 km range .It became affliated to pandit Ravishankar shukla university Raipur in 1983 and became a government institution. The college was shifted to its present building constructed in 1996 by the government of Madhyapradesh ,with B.A ,B.SC and BCOM programmes. Undergraduate course in B.SC was started in 1986 and B.COM in 1987 .Later PG programmes of MA economics, MA sociology , MA hindi literature were introduced in 2004 .MA english literature in 2014.MSC chemistry and M.SC zoology programmes were started in 2015 Every year a large number of rural students both boys and girls take admission in different programmes of UG and PG. ., It has campus of about 8 acres. It is affliated to bastar university since 2009. At present the institution offers UG and PG courses in Arts, commerce and science. In UG courses B.A, B.SC, B.COM and in PG courses M.SC (Zoology and Chemistry), M.A (sociology ,economics, hindi literature, English literature) is .In B.A political science ,sociology ,economics,hindi literature,English currently run by the institution literature subjects ,in B.sc maths ,botany ,zoology ,chemistry ,physics and in B COM all compulsory subjects are offered in the institution .. In 2007 four rooms were added to the infrastructure by NMDC LTD.Kirandul . presently the college has 12 class rooms one seminar hall, NCC and NSS room, 4 labs one library room, a gymnasium and a canteen .The college has a student strength of 298 in the current session . The college is serving the society by giving education to tribal and rural students majority of them are first generation learners.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Criterion 1 : Currricular aspects

The institution makes effort in effective implementation of curriculum .Being affliated to Bastar University,the

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syllabus and overall guidelines are followed as laid down by the university. The syllabi are reviewed and approved by the members of board of studies of university. The institution develops and design action plans for effective implementation of syllabus. Lesson plan are prepared by all subjects teachers in their teaching diary prior to delivery of lecture in class .

The college offers programmes in arts, science and commerce . There are 7 subjects in 3 combinations available for the degree of B.A, 7 subjects in B.SC available in 2 combinations, and for B.COM all compulsory subjects . Environmental studies is included as a compulsory subject in first year of undergraduate programme . The institution offers 06 postgraduate programmes and 03 undergraduate programmes . Project work is included in the subject of botany and sociology . Proposals for 05 new programmes are submitted to the bastar university. All UG programmes are run on annual system and PG programmes on semester system. The principal conducts meeting with teachers and develop strategies for effective implementation of curriculum. The students results and feedback are analysed for evaluating teaching learning process. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in various conferences and seminars so that they become familiar with latest information . students participation in various activities is monitored by various committees throughout the year.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

CRITERIA II -TEACHING LEARNING AN D EVALUATION

Govt.Arvind College Kirandul follows the policies stated by the department of Higher education ,Govt. of Chattisgarh .The institution admits student from all sections of society and the mechanism of admission is transparent and student friendly. The admissions to various classes or programmes are made in accordance with the procedures prescribed by state government and Bastar University Jagdalpur ,Chattisgarh .Notification regarding admission is displayed on the college notice boards as well as on the website of college (www.gackdl.ac.in) for helping students to get easy access to the admission process .Online form filling facility as well as declaration of merit list on college notice boards helps in maintaining transparency. To make better understanding about selection of subjects counseling of the students at the entry level is also organized by admission committee of college. The admission in all courses is made through merit in the qualifying examination with special concession to

socially backward sections of the society according to the reservation rule of CG Government. To cater to the diverse needs of the students various subjects combinations are offered so that the students can choose the subjects according to their liking . A help desk has been made for providing assistance to students regarding selection of subjects as well as solving any query regarding admission .students from all category ST,SC,OBC, GENERAL and with multi -cultural background are admitted.During last five years there is increase in no. of SC,ST students admission.The college has enhanced teaching learning of students through various activities organised by subject teachers such as group discussions ,guest lectures,essay,debate,quiz competitions ,role play etc.Continous evaluation is carried out through unit tests , half yearly and model examinations .For PG students 20 marks are alloted from internal assessment.In M.SC zoology 20 marks have been included for seminars .Internal assessment exams are conducted as per the Bastar university and according to the dates scheduled in academic Calendar of events .University exams as per the norms of University .As per rules of affliating University there is provision of photocopy of answerbooks ,retotalling and revaluation at the undergraduate level from the university.

Research, Innovations and Extension

CRITERIA III -RESEARCH , CONSULTANCY , EXTENSION AND COLLABORATION

The College has a a functional research advisory committee. The research committee of the college encourages the faculty members to take work. The teachers are granted duty leave to motivate research activities. A national seminar has been organized in year 2019 by funding from CGCOST

. The institutions does not have separate budget for research but teachers are encouraged to participate in seminars and workshops organised in other academic institutions. wi-fi and internet facilities available in college for easy access to learning materials .The extension activities of the college are monitored by faculty coordinator of NSS ,NCC .students actively participate in various community services like health awareness, cleanliness drives ,tree plantation programmes etc.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

CRITERIA IV- INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The College runs in own builing with built up area of 2.52 acres of land . College campus spread over 8 acres of land . With the financial aid of NMDC ,04 new class rooms have been constructed in year 2007. There are 12 teaching class rooms in college building. There are separate laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, . A computer room for students with 8 computers. The college has various amenities such as a seminar hall with a LCD projector , sports facility,equipments, and library facility, Wi-fi connections have been made available to the computer room,staff room and office room. LCD projector facility is available in zoology laboratory for seminars by M.SC zoology students . Recently Smart board has been installed in 4 classrooms . The college has a playground . The building and campus are maintented regularly. Different committees are working to look after facilities and infrastructure of the college. Clean water supply is ensured and cleanliness is specially taken care of. Toilets and bathrooms are cleaned regularly . One common room for girls are provided with required facility such as sanitary napkin vending machine ,sanitary napkin disposal system . for the benefit of female students of the college .

CRITERIA V -STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college works in close association with all stakeholders to ensure all round development of students .The teachers act as guardians for the welfare of students .A Parent teacher association have been formed and feedback have been collected from local parents .Student union an elected body that represents students bridges the gap between administration and students .Various committees have been formed to coordinate student support such as grievance redressal committee ,anti-ragging comittee ,janbhagidari commitee .students belonging to SC/ST/OBC category receive scholarships from state government as well as from NMDC .Teachers keep record of students attendance,internal assessment ,result analysis .Many students have gone for higher studies and some have passed competitive examinations .Students are encouraged to take part in extracurricular activities such as sports,cultural activities ,NCC and NSS to improve their personality .Students

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have representing college at various levels .Nisha Majhi ,Podium Podiya and Uma participated in national youth festival Lucknow in year 2019. .Students from NCC units also representing at various national events .-Naresh kumar ,Madvi Podiya attended the Trekking shivalik camp meerut (U.P) and E.B.S.B Camp , Indore M.P in year 2019. NIC camp at Sikkim was attended by Salman khan ,Ramesh kumar,Hurra Ram Mandavi ,Ajay kumar sori, Aaytu in year 2017.Workshop on career orientation programme have been organised for students in 2016 and 2017 .A national level seminar have been organised in year 2019 in which PG students participated actively .students have also brought pride by winning gold medals at university level for holding first position in M.SC Chemistry(Ravi Gupta) and M.SC Zoology(Deepshikha Saxena) in 2019. The college has closely been associated with community outreach programmes to make them realize their social obligations and responsibilities .The college has adopted one village' *bainpal'* in year 2017 .Annual camp of NSS organised at village *patelpara,kodenar ,padhapur* village and surveys done in these villages about socio- economic status

Governance, Leadership and Management

CRITERIA VI-GOVERNANCE ,LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

The college functions under leadership of principal to ensure formulation and implementation of all policies ,plans and programmes effectively .The college administration is run with the support of various academic ,extra-academic and administrative committees. Various committees work in coordination to achieve the goals and objectives of the institution.

The teaching staff play an important role in nurturing leadership skills among students. The student union is an integral part in inculcating leadership skills. The college promotes participative management at academic and administrative levels .powers are decentralised and responsibilities are communicated to the conveners of various committees. The principal and the staff interact with students to take care of their progress. Budget allocation to the college is made by the State Government which is disbursed by the principal to different

departments/committees for purchasing books, equipments and other necessary expenditure. The financial management is assisted by the Accountant deputed for this purpose by the principal of college. As the college is affliated to bastar university ,jagdalpur leadership is provided to faculty members in both academic and administrative bodies of college such as academic council,Board of studies etc. by the University .The IQAC has been established in the institution to improve overall quality and achieve the goals of the institution.

1. Daily morning assembly with singing of national anthem

Our daily morning assembly starts at 10.30 a.m. where our students techers and other staff gather in the courtyard area and begin their day with singing of national anthem followed by thought of the day, then some news headlines sometimes students are required to give a speech or some songs are sung on patriotism. The principal makes some announcements of necessary to motivate students for their studies and other information about activities or programme to be held in college.

2. cleanliness Drive

All students ,teaching staff,non-teaching staff,NSS and NCC volunteers of our college participate in swachhta abhiyan of the college campus.students clean the campus ,in addition students also instructed in NSS Camp about cleanliness to actively participate in cleanliness ,they in turn encourage people of the locality about the importance of cleanliness. students participate in debates ,essays ,Human chain formation ,nukkad natak in Swachhta pakhwada organized by NMDC LTD KIRANDUL. Apart from above mentioned activities the college is working towards creating awareness to save environment .To make the campus eco friendly , tree plantation is done every year by college students and staff ,some energy conservation measures have also been taken .

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response: -The institution is affliated to Bastar university ,Jagdalpur which offers all courses .The college follows the curriculum prescribed by University through the Board of studies . Some faculty members are nominated as members of Board of Studies and contributed towards curriculum development .The college ensures effective curriculum delivery through following mechanism:

Academic Calendar-The college follows academic calendar of university and executes it. The principal monitors the effective implementation of calendar through meetings and discussion with faculty.

Time Table Committee -The college constitutes the timetable committee .The time table is prepared and displayed on Notice Board .The syllabus link of University is also provided to students .Syllabus of every subject is divided into several units in general which is taught according to the specific time table. Faculty ensures conduct of lecture sssions as per time table every day

Teaching Plan and teaching Diary -Teaching Plan is prepared by every faculty at the beginning of the academic year to maintain the reord of teaching practicals etc.

Laboratories for curriculum delivery of practicals

Teaching aids -Study materials ,notes are provided to students .Social sites like YOUTUBE ,whattsapp etc.are used for effective teaching .Seminars,Group Discussion ,quiz are organised for students.

Teacher support -The colleges encourages the faculty to participate in faculty development programmes and to attend meetings of BOS and syllabus constructing workshops .

Feedback -The college has started collecting feedback from last year from faculty and atudents .The collected feedback are analysed to assess the performance of students and teachers.

.The institution has adopted a examination scheme . schedule is prepared for the conduct of internal examinations and assignments .The programme is given below- class test examination –Monthly,pre-final examination. Respective subject teachers also conduct class tests every month and students are kept informed about their performance.Students are made aware of their weakness and suggestions are given to improve their performance.

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response: The internal assessments are conducted as per mentioned in the academic calendar issued by Higher education Chattisgarh and Bastar university.

As per bastar university assessment parameters ,students evaluation is divided into two assessment level.Internal assessment (institute level) for 20 marks and end semester examination at the PG level for 80 marks conducted by university.In order to ensure transparency in internal assessment the system of internal assessment is communicated to students in time .All attendance records in internal examinations,summary of marks are properly maintained by teachers for academic audit .Valuation is done by respective subject teacher .

As at the UG level ,there is no semester system hence along with internal assessment model test is conducted at the institute level every year which is followed by the annual examination.

Internal assessment in the institute is robust and transparent. The institute follows the rules and regulations of Bastar university for the internal evaluation process of theory and practical papers.

During lectures students are made aware of the annual examination pattern of the university and also of internal evaluation mechanism consisting of unit tests, quarterly examinations, half yearly examinations, pre final examinations. student feedback has also been collected to evaluate the quality of teaching learning. These exams are held in a formal manner to make the student familiar with the university exams. Record of students are kept by the concerned subject teacher. The students are made aware of the shortcomings and given suggestions to refine their answers and perform better in future annual examination. For practical examination evaluation is done with transparency based on different parameters like practical records, teachers assessment, performance and viva-voice.

In case of internal examination ,examination related time table is decided by institution and displayed on notice board. To ensure proper conduct of examination two invigilators are assigned in each exam room. If examinee has any grievance arising out during the process of internal evaluation one is free to discuss with subject teacher. The matter is resolved based on academic facts. If a student is not able to appear in exam due to medical or any other genuine reason , internal examination is conducted for that student as per norms , provided he submits application to the subject teacher. The grievance of the students related to assessment are made clear by showing his/her performance in answersheet.

Grievances related to university exams regarding a question, the examinee is asked to write and complete the exam after which a letter is written to registrar of bastar university with the related problem and exact grievance. The students against whom U.F.M cases are registered in final exams are dealt justifiaebly. With reference to external examination evaluation, if a student scores less marks then expected he/she can apply for revaluation of his/her answersheet after paying the prescribed fee ., University provides the photocopies of their answer sheets to students . If the student feels that the evaluation is not correct, he/she can apply for revaluation .

The college was shifted to its present building near railway station constructed in 1996 by the government of Madhyapradesh ,with B.A ,B.SC and BCOM programmes. Later PG programmes of MAeconomics, MA sociology ,MA hindi literature were introduced in 2004. MA english literature in 2014. MSC chemistry and M.SC zoology programmes were started in 2015 Every year a large number of rural students both boys and girls take admission in different programmes of UG and PG.

College gives priority to promote education for students of rural background .For this the institution provides fees exemption facility to students of farming community, agricultural labourer and agricultural artisan .

SC,ST,OBC students are totally exempted from tution fees .Besides government scholarship ,the institution provides scholarship to undergraduate SC,ST,OBC students through NMDC .The institution has also made effort to arrange for bus service provided by NMDC for students comming from bacheli and nearby villages since last ten years.The institution has more no. of SC,ST students and the no. of SC,ST and OBC students admission has increased during recent years .The institution inculcates in its students social consiousness through various outreach programmes in local community .The college is continually serving needy and underprilized sections of students since 47 years .The green campus provides a scene and peaceful atmosphere for performing academic and extracurricular activities .
